

How big is the problem of single-use cups?







In 2018, est. < 0.25% of lined fibre coffee cups were recycled



without a charge, the number of single-use cups could rise to around 450 million in 2025*




Single-use drinks cups create 5,400 tonnes of waste annually in Scotland of which 96% is landfilled*



approx. spend £1.16m per year on waste collection & disposal, and £4k on littered


Each year, Scotland uses 3333.7 bigle-use beverage cups




That's about a million cups every single day!



Of the 388.7 million single-use cups used in Scotland each year...





388.7 million single-use cups amounts to 71 cups per person, per year - one of the highest rates compared to nations in the European Union.

Single-use cups research:

In 2019, the <u>Cups Sold Separately Field trial</u> <u>and evidence review of disposable cup</u> <u>charges</u> study suggested that by replacing reusable cup discounts with an equivalent, cost-neutral disposable coffee cup charge, retailers could significantly increase reusable cup use without impacting sales, and with no cost increase to consumers



An environmental charge isn't a new idea..

This initiative builds on the success of the single-use carrier bag charge (2014), which effectively:

- changed consumer behaviour,
- reduced carrier bag litter (Marine Conservation Society recently reported 80% less carrier bag litter)

The Scottish Government consultation

- The Scottish Government recently consulted on the proposal to introduce a minimum 25p charge on single-use beverage cups to tackle the significant environmental impact of these items.
- It aims to reduce the consumption of single-use disposable beverage cups by incentivising the use of reusable alternatives.
- This supports Scotland's transition to a circular economy, where resources are valued and kept in use for as long as possible.

More than half of people in Scotland (56%) back additional measures to reduce single-use cups



74% of people in Scotland said a charge on single-use cups would encourage them to use a reusable cup more



A summary of consultation proposals

25p single-use cup

Milk

Sugar

The Scottish Government consulted on the proposal to introduce a minimum 25p charge on single-use drinks cups to tackle the significant environmental impact of these items.

A charge should apply to all single-use beverage cups when an individual buys a drink of any kind.

The charge would **apply regardless of cup material**, and therefore would include cups made of biodegradable material or bio-based plastics. These are still single-use.

<u>So the ultimate goal is ... a transition to</u> <u>reusables/refillables</u>

Ditching Disposables pilot 1

The Ditching Disposables initiative launched in 2021 and looked to reduce the use of disposables which was trialled across multiple businesses in Portobello.



Ditching Disposables pilot 2



Ditching Disposables <u>Stirling</u> trialled a city-wide scheme for reusable cups. It involved 20 cafés/shops adopting Ditching Disposables branded, reusable, returnable cups and lids. The scheme was also piloted at a smaller scale with events and bigger venues.

Across the scheme, 1,761 cups were taken by customers, and 888 returned (around 50% are still in circulation with customers).
